## Hotel rooftop bar the spot to see planes, celebrities

IF you like your cocktail with a view then you'll want to check out Sydney's newest rooftop bar.

Branksome Hotel opened in Robey St, Mascot, in October last year and it's already gained a reputation for its stunning rooftop garden bar.

"It's a fantastic space," Ben Chandwani, Branksome's commercial director, said. "You have views over the airport to Port Botany and then to the citv.'

The 146-suite hotel is the pet project of Regional Express Airlines (Rex) boss Lim Kim Hai, who had

intended to build a penthouse apartment on top of the hotel.

Instead, he built the rooftop bar and in the process created the perfect drinking spot for planespotters. It's also a great location for celebrity

spotting, with the private charter area of the airport within a stone's throw of the hotel.

"We've had the New Zealand Prime Minister down there, Elton John and the other week we had (ex-US president) Obama," Mr Chandwani said.

The man behind the bar is Sudhir Chandra who has spent the last few years honing his skills in the flashy bars of the Middle East. Among his creations is The Branksome — a mix of vodka, Vermouth, espresso and cinnamon cream. For those with a sweet tooth he recommends the Toblerone (Kahlua, crème de cacao, Frangelico, Baileys, honey

and cream).

So good is the view Mr Kim Hai felt it unfair to reserve it for hotel guests, so anyone can can go there.

"There's nothing else like this around here," Mr Chandwani said. "It really is a stunning view.'

## **Triplets**



WHEN Sophie Smith's husband died, she feared the memory of their triplets would be lost.

But having teamed up with journalist Deborah Fitzgerald, her babies' stories have been preserved in her new memoir Sophie's Boys. The Coogee mum lost her triplets in 2006 after they were born premature. She had two more sons with her husband Ash. But in 2016 he tragically died from brain cancer.

"Ash was the only person on that journey with me," she said. "When he died it was almost like the memory of our children was being taken away. So it feels important to have written their stories.

The memoir, which is out now, tells of her triplets' lives and deaths and the founding of her charity Running for **Premature Babies** Foundation which has raised more than \$2.5 million to date.

"I don't want the book to be depressing. I hope it shows that there can be hope in despair and light out of the darkness."
